Dear Friends,

Since 2015, the Early Childhood Alliance (ECA) has brought together community leaders, early childhood stakeholders, and families to identify gaps, secure resources, and build a more cohesive early childhood system in Onondaga County.

This report showcases the results of our collective efforts to mobilize resources in support of children and families in 2022 and provides a snapshot of the many ways our initiatives are making an impact on families and providers across the county. It also offers a glimpse into the tremendous growth we've experienced in the eight years since our launch.

Under the exceptional leadership of my predecessor, Laurie Black, the ECA has become a national model for cross-sector partnerships, growing from a staff of one to a team of 12 with an operating budget in excess of \$2.5 million. Building on that momentum, we will continue to strengthen and expand our work while looking forward to the promise and possibility of the future.





Centering & Engaging Family Voice

The Parents in Partnership Initiative builds partnerships with parents and families in Onondaga County, identifies their strengths, provides leadership opportunities, and increases their voice and engagement in the work of the ECA and its partner organizations.

100% of Thriving Not Just Surviving peer to peer group participants showed an increase in self-efficacy.



40% of Parent Advisory Council members served on other committees impacting the work of the ECA.

2022 Successes

- Three members of the Parent Advisory Council completed the Train the Trainers program for the Community Organizing and Family Issues (COFI) parent leadership model.
- The Mother Cabrini Health Foundation and the Health Foundation for Western and Central New York renewed their investment in the initiative.
- The ECA was accepted into the Center for the Study of Social Policy's (CSSP) Parent Leader Network (PLN).



Ensuring Children Develop On Track

Help Me Grow Onondaga empowers parents and caregivers with knowledge about child development, connects them to the services and supports their child(ren) need to thrive, and strives to increase developmental screening.

67% of families who completed a screen and received support learned something new about child development, parenting, and/or community resources.



69% of families who completed a screen and received support **did something new** to support their child's development.



99% of survey respondents indicated that Help Me Grow met their needs.



Supporting Early Literacy

Talk, Read, Sing Onondaga is a public awareness and action campaign that helps parents and caregivers recognize their power to boost their children's early brain and vocabulary development through simple, everyday actions.

Spotlight on Success.....

In June, Talk, Read, Sing Onondaga partnered with the Rosamond Gifford Zoo at Burnet Park and Onondaga County Public Libraries to launch a special "And Tango Makes Three" StoryWalk® in celebration of Father's

Day, Pride Month, and families of all kinds. Members of the Parent Advisory Council and their families, along with ParentChild+ program families, were special guests at the launch event.



Building a High-Quality Child Care & Early Learning Infrastructure

The Child Care Quality Improvement (CCQI) initiative is a partnership between Child Care Solutions and the Early Childhood Alliance and is funded by Onondaga County. CCQI is an actionable plan for improving the quality of child care within Onondaga County's existing infrastructure of care, resulting in optimal child development and school readiness.

Developmental screenings were conducted by **100%** of participating programs.



4 new child care providers joined the cohort.



The first CCQI cohort, which included 3 center-based and 11 home-based providers, concluded in December. Coaches delivered 3,300+ hours of coaching, technical assistance, and support to participating educators. The second cohort, serving 40+ home-based child care educators, is set to launch in 2023.



88% of participating providers engaged with all elements of the model.



Strengthening Families

Catholic Charities' ParentChild+ Program focuses on bridging the opportunity gap and strengthening families and communities to ensure all children have equal possibilities from the start and are prepared for school and life success.

100% of participating children showed overall improvement in one or more of the 5 behavior areas.



84% of 2022 graduates entered a high-quality pre-k or kindergarten program.

2022 Successes

- Early Learning Specialists celebrated 32 family graduations from the core portion of the program.
- The family child care (FCC) portion of the program began the year with 3 participating providers. All 3 providers graduated from the program, and 27 children were served.
- 100% of survey respondents were satisfied with the program.



Supporting Reproductive Well-Being

The Reproductive Well-Being Initiative is committed to reproductive justice, woman-centered care, dispelling myths, and changing social norms to empower young women with positive self-images and independent choice.

25 young women trained in professional work skills and social impact at city-wide ambassador training in August.

2022 Successes

- Layla ambassadors partnered with the Central New York Community Foundation's LeadSafeCNY initiative to implement a \$150,000 participatory budgeting project aimed at addressing childhood lead poisoning in Syracuse.
- The Reproductive Wellbeing Coalition hosted a total of 5 community convenings, including "Roe My God," which featured a presentation about changes to the abortion landscape and a conversation with local experts around community violence.
